Sunday of St. Mary of Egypt

Saint Mary was born and raised in Egypt during the reign of the Emperor Justinian (527-656). She was a woman of remarkable beauty. Although baptized a Christian by her parents, upon reaching adolescence, Mary turned to a life of fornication. Finally after seventeen years of this life, her insatiable desires brought her to Jerusalem on the Third Sunday of Lent: the Feast of the Veneration of the Holy Cross. Joining a group of Christians, whose love for Christ peaked her curiosity, she attempted to follow them into the Church of the Holy Sepulcher to see the relic of the Holy Cross. She was prevented, however, from crossing over the threshold of the church by an invisible power. She tried several more times, but each time was unable to enter. For the first time in her life, Mary began to fear God, to see her sinfulness and to realize that it was her own unworthiness that prevented her from entering this holy place. In a fervent act of repentance, Mary vowed to turn from her sins. She immediately made a sincere supplication to the Theotokos and was allowed to venerate the Holy Cross. After leaving the church, Mary went to a monastery near the Jordan River on the edge of the desert, where she confessed her sins

and received Holy Communion. With only two loaves of bread and the clothes on her back, Mary left the world to enter the desert and further repent of her immoral life. For the next forty years, Mary lived in the desert, shedding many tears, praying and fighting-off many unspeakable temptations from her former life. Mary’s sincere repentance allowed her to be purged and sanctified by God’s merciful grace. At the very end of her life, Mary came into contact with the Hieromonk St. Zosima, who heard her confession and gave her Holy Communion. With the zeal of the martyrs, St. Mary became one whose life is upheld by the Church as an example of repentance. During Great Lent, each of us seeks repentance, turning from our own vices and passions and setting our minds and hearts on God. Through the intercessions of the most Holy Theotokos, God grants us the gift of compunction to turn from our wounds and sins to find healing and comfort in Him. Let us remember and be inspired by Saint Mary of Egypt and her wonderful redemption. During the rest of this Lenten journey, may we pray to be freed from our imprisonment to the passions that enslave us and strive to sincerely repent no matter how grave our sins.

HYMNS OF THE SMALL ENTRANCE

Resurrectional Hymn (First Mode)

The stone had been sealed before Your tomb by the Jews, and the soldiers guarding did watch o’er Your pure and sacred body. O Savior, the third day You arose, and unto all the world did You give life. Whereby all the heavenly powers did proclaim that You are the giver of life. Glory to Your resurrection, O Christ. Glory to Your kingdom. Glory to Your dispensation, O You alone Who loves all.

Hymn of St. Mary of Egypt (Plagal Fourth Mode)
In you the image was preserved with exactness, O Mother; for, taking up your cross, you followed Christ, and by your deeds you taught us to overlook the flesh, for it passes away, but to attend to the soul, since it is immortal. Therefore, O righteous Mary, your spirit rejoices with the angels.

Hymn of St. John the Baptist (Second Mode)
The memory of the just is celebrated with hymns of praise, but the Lord’s testimony is sufficient for you, O Forerunner; for you have proved to be truly more venerable than the Prophets, since you were granted to baptize in the stream Him Whom they proclaimed. Therefore, having contested for the truth, you rejoiced to announce the good tidings even to those in Hades:

that God has appeared in the flesh, taking away the sin of the world and granting to us great mercy.

Kontakion of the Theotokos (Second Mode)

A protection of Christians unshamable, intercessor to our Holy Maker unwavering, reject not the prayerful cries of those who are in sin. Instead, come to us, for you are good; your loving help bring unto us, who are crying in faith to you: Hasten to intercede and speed now to supplicate, as a protection for all time, Theotokos, for those who honor you.

EPISTLE READING

Hebrews 9:11-14 (Sunday of St. Mary of Egypt)
Brethren, when Christ appeared as a high priest of the good things that have come, then through the greater and more perfect tent (not made with hands, that is, not of this creation) He entered once for all into the Holy Place, taking not the blood of goats and calves but His own blood, thus securing an eternal redemption. For if the sprinkling of defiled persons with the blood of goats and bulls and with the ashes of a heifer sanctifies for the purification of the flesh, how much more shall the blood of Christ, who through the eternal Spirit offered Himself without blemish to God, purify your conscience from dead works to serve the living God.

GOSPEL READING

Mark 10:32-45 (Sunday of St. Mary of Egypt)
At that time, Jesus took His twelve disciples, and He began to tell them what was to happen to Him, saying, "Behold, we are going up to Jerusalem; and the Son

of man will be delivered to the chief priests and the scribes, and they will condemn Him to death, and deliver Him to the Gentiles; and they will mock Him, and spit upon Him, and scourge Him, and kill Him; and after three days He will rise." And James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to Him, and said to Him, "Teacher, we want You to do for us whatever we ask of You." And He said to them, "What do you want Me to do for you?" And they said to Him, "Grant us to sit, one at Your right hand and one at Your left, in Your glory." But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or to be baptized with the baptism with which I am baptized?" And they said to him, "We are able." And Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at My right hand or at My left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared." And when the ten heard it, they began to be indignant of James and John. And Jesus called them to Him and said to them, "You know that those who are supposed to rule over the Gentiles lord it over them, and their great men exercise authority over them. But it shall not be so among you; but whoever would be great among you must be your servant, and whoever would be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of man also came not to be served but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many."

Megalynarion for the Liturgy of St. Basil the Great (Instead of “It Is Truly Right”)
In you who are full of grace, all creation rejoices – both the congregations of angels and the human race. O consecrated temple and spiritual paradise, the boast of virgins, from you was God incarnate and became a child – He, our God, who existed before the ages. For He made your womb a throne and He made you more spacious than the heavens. In you who are full of grace, all creation rejoices. Glory be to you.
